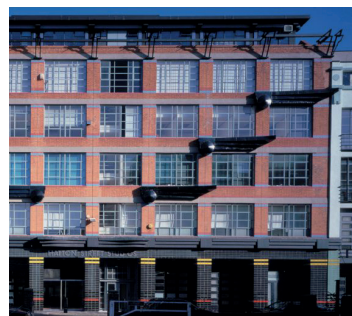
## **Hidden Treasures of Southwark** **Weston Williamson + Partners**
